About the Book

In *Justine McKeen*, *Pooper Scooper*, the third book in the Justine McKeen series, Justine gets her friends to help her clean up the dog poop in the park across from the school board's offices in an effort to get the attention of the superintendent of schools. She hopes the efforts of her crew of cheerful pooper scoopers will help get the superintendent to see that bringing their school librarian back to work is the right thing to do.

About the Writing

This book was certainly personal for me. I had the same experience that Jimmy Blatzo did, in my home town of Red Deer in Alberta. I sat in the grass in a beautiful park to enjoy reading a book, and much too late discovered that I had solidly sat on a pile of dog poop. Grrrr. The more important reason that it is personal for me is that as I travel to make presentations at schools, I often find that school boards are cutting the hours of librarians, and, for all the reasons presented in the book, I wish this wouldn't happen.

Teaching Ideas—Curriculum Connections

Prereading Idea

Justine McKeen and her friends want to make a difference. But they are only kids, and the adults around them are in charge of decisions at the school. What ways can students influence those decisions? What are good ways? What are disrespectful ways?

Classroom Discussion Questions

- 1. How did people dispose of their body wastes before the toilet was invented?
- 2. How did the invention of the flush toilet make such a big difference in preventing the spread of disease?
- 3. What is the system of making sure books can be quickly found in a library and how important is it to know the system?
- 4. Is the internet a safe place without adult guidance? What kinds of things should a child beware of in cyberspace?
- 5. When you are doing research on the internet, how can you decide whether the research is accurate or biased? (And what does biased mean?)

Suggested Activities

- How many dogs live in your hometown, and how many pounds of waste does this create in a day?
- Ask your librarian to explain the Dewey Decimal system.
- Research on the internet how dog waste is bad for people, and find three examples.
- Research on the internet how people are tackling the problem of dog waste and find three examples.
- Have a contest to see who can find a certain book the fastest in the school library.
