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Teaching Ideas—Curriculum Connections

Prereading Ideas

Lark Takes a Bow is a mystery-adventure starring a brother-and-sister team of sleuths.

- Lark and Connor are called to investigate when someone starts playing pranks at the community theater. Have any of your students ever seen a play or acted in one?
- Who are some of their favorite actors? Why?
- Have students discuss the kinds of jobs/tasks that need to be done in order for a play to run successfully.

Classroom Discussion Questions

- 1. Having discussed the types of jobs that happen behind the curtain, ask students which ones they think they'd like to do.
- 2. Someone is playing tricks at the theater. What might be the motivation for the prankster to do this?
- 3. Why might the director want to shut down the play? Do students think this is fair?
- 4. Before reading the final chapters, ask students who they believe is responsible for the pranks.
- 5. Once the prankster is revealed, ask them what they think of that person's reasons for doing what they did.
- 6. What other ways might the prankster have solved their problem?
- 7. How do you feel about the way the problem of the pranks and the prankster was resolved?

Suggested Activities

- 1. Part of being an actor is memorizing lines. Have students pick a paragraph from the book and memorize it.
- 2. Have students design charms for the fronts of their desks.
- 3. Ask students to choose a scene from the book and act it out for their classmates.
- 4. As a creative-writing exercise, have students imagine a different culprit for the story and write an alternate ending.
- 5. Have students design a diorama of one of the scenes from Lark Takes a Bow.
