### Chapter 1-2

Delia proudly wears her mom's earrings to school, but disaster strikes.

- 1. Why do you think Delia wanted to wear her mom's earrings to school?
- 2. How would you feel if you lost something special that didn't belong to you?

### Chapter 3-4

Back at home, Delia struggles with guilt and hides the truth from her family.

- 1. What does Delia learn about her relationship with Grandma Jo?
- 2. Why is it important to talk to someone when you're upset?

## Chapter 5-6

Delia learns that she, her mom and her grandmother are all Métis.


- 1. How does learning about her Métis ancestry change Delia's perspective?
- 2. Why do you think Grandma Jo kept their heritage a secret?











#### Chapter 7-8

Delia confesses the truth to her mother and wants to make things right.

- 1. Why is telling the truth important, even when it's difficult?
- 2. What does Delia's idea for the story contest say about her character?

#### Chapter 9-10

Inspired by a book about Métis culture, Delia comes up with a story idea.

- 1. How do Delia's actions show she is reconnecting with her Métis culture?
- 2. What does winning the writing contest mean to her?

#### Chapter 11-13

Delia and Grandma Jo fill out their Métis applications and Delia gets her prize money.

- 1. How does Delia's final gift to her mom resolve the story?
- 2. How do Delia, her mom and Grandma Jo show pride in being Métis?

## **Métis Cultural Insights**

The book is an introduction to Métis culture, beadwork, storytelling and language. Discuss the significance of beadwork, family traditions and how stories are passed down through generations. Invite a Métis community member to speak or demonstrate beadwork, if possible.

- 2. Imagine meeting an animal like Pipik the porcupine. What adventures would you have together?
- 3. Create your own illustrated flashcards of Michif words.
